³'Back' can indicate reversal, deletion, part of a charade, and also = STERN OF REAR.

⁴'Wheel' can = O (see **Bits and Pieces**, on p. 3).

⁵But 'say' can also = FOR EXAMPLE.

⁶'Broadcast' can indicate an anagram, a homophone, or = ON AIR or perhaps SOWN.

⁷Distinguishing incompleteness from selection — which may signal a container or hidden answer — can be tricky.

⁸'Ultimately', 'initially', 'from the beginning', 'after the debut', &c. can suggest acronym, initialism, or telestitch (see n. 16).

⁹'Pair of' can mean first two letters (also 'pair' can = PR); 'Couple' can = WED.

¹⁴'Final check' can = checkmate, e.g. *A final check by extremely unpopular hobbyist* (7) ⇒ A+MATE+UR (FS in G&M, 09 Aug. 2008, clue 15A).

¹⁵But 'possessed' can = RAVING.

¹⁶Some hiddens (e.g. 'starts from') are telestiches, e.g. *Fat characters ending "As You Like It"* (4) ⇒ SUET (FS in G&M, 22 Oct 2007, clue 25D).

¹⁷In' can = POPULAR, ELECTED, &c. (see **Some Common Synonyms**, on p. 3).

¹⁸But 'host' can = many (HORDE, SLEW, C, TON, &c.) or = EMCEE (MC) as well as indicating a container or hidden answer.

¹⁹But 'some' can = ANY in a charade, e.g. *Fidgety Eliot opens some* (5) ⇒ AN(T.S.)Y

(FS in G&M, 15 Sept 2007, clue 15A).

²⁰'Cross' can = T, just as 'fork' can = Y, 'bend' can = ESS, &c.
